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I-70 COALITION OFFERS FRONT RANGE TRAVELERS TIPS FOR THE UPCOMING HOLIDAY WEEKEND

(I-70 Mountain Corridor) — The Interstate 70 Mountain Transportation Corridor Coalition (I-70 Coalition) is offering tips for the upcoming holiday weekend to encourage convenient, safe travel along the I-70 corridor.

The Coalition, which is comprised of more than 30 private and public partners working on short and long-term solutions for congestion along the I-70 corridor, offer these tips to get motorists out of traffic and on to their destination:

- **Be an overnighiter, not a daytripper.** Spend the night and extend the fun into the next day. Share the cost of a condo or rental unit with a group of friends. Online lodging portals like Vail On Sale (vailonsale.net) and Summit County's SummitCountyColorado.com offer amazing lodging specials and promotions.
- **Telecommute.** Work with your employer to create a flexible working schedule for the holiday weekend. For example, work four 10-hour days to get a day ahead of other travelers. Not only will you avoid traffic jams, you'll have the grocery aisles all to yourself.
- **Travel during non-peak times.** Leave Denver a day or two in advance of this holiday weekend and stay in the mountains until Monday to take full advantage of the limitless summer activities.
- **Look before you drive.** Check on traffic conditions before you leave. You can check up-to-the-minute road conditions on television Channel 22 in Summit County or on the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) travel website, www.cotrip.org or by dialing 511 from any phone. The I-70 Coalition's Web site, www.i70solutions.org boasts three mountain webcams.
- **Take the scenic route home.** There are wonderful shops, visitor's centers, microbrews, historic monuments and more along I-70. During heavy traffic times, take the next exit and find a fun distraction such as shopping at the unique shops along the corridor or dining at your favorite restaurant.
- **Go green:** Organize a group and carpool; utilize public transportation and/or shuttle services – convenient options include, ridecme.com or greyhound.com.

“The Coalition continues to work together to create solutions to alleviate the current levels of congestion on I-70 while long term solutions can be developed and implemented,” said Eric Turner, I-70 Coalition TDM Committee Chair and member of the Summit Chamber Board. “The more we can encourage the public to utilize existing alternative transportation options, the closer we come to realizing our goals that work in the best interest of everyone traveling I-70.”
